Maryland's Fourth District would be acutely affected by a shutdown. Our community is home to many government agencies and contractors due to our proximity to Washington. And while this isn't our first rodeo with shutdown shenanigans, it's impossible to predict exactly what will happen this time around.

We might not have all the answers right now, but we can share some best practices learned from previous shutdowns.
